MESSAGE FROM THE TRIPS DIRECTOR

Thank you to everyone who provided photos and information about their trips! The Spring season included a variety of activities with a diversity of members. At the core of each trip are volunteers who value the purpose of Sub Sig and figure out how to make everyone feel safe and welcomed at the Cabin.

Open discussions between members over the last six months generated some changes in trip operations and activities. One result is that Cabin Usage is on pace for a good year. Cabin Usage is a key performance indicator of how well Sub Sig is accomplishing its purpose. It is simply the total number of overnights at the Cabin per year.

Central to the discussions was a desire among everyone to preserve Sub Sig's legacy and purpose. That has not changed. You can find more information on the Trips Director midterm report on the shared google drive. Please contact the Trips Director if you have not received the link and access.

One question arose from the midterm report. Do the number of trips a year impact Cabin Usage? While cabin usage declined over a twenty-year period, the number of trips increased slightly even without excluding the pandemic years. Another question arose asking if the number of members impact Cabin Usage. Not as much as some may believe. Sub Sig has always been a small volunteer nonprofit club to fill an important and meaningful niche. While the number of trips, trip leaders, and members are important to sustain Sub Sig, the data suggests that these are not reasons that Cabin usage declined. The advisory council considered other reasons. The policies for trip operations and activities address them.

Members occasionally ask about trips during the week. While possible, requests are infrequent. Trip requests on weekends and holidays are the most popular. Volunteer capacity is another factor. Sub Sig is a small club. That has advantages, but also trade-offs. When interest and volunteer capacity converge, trips during the week will happen. For now, they are mostly when holidays fall on a weekday.

The fire pit at the Cabin is great! But please be careful. We don't want to start a forest fire or burn down the Cabin. Bring extra water and watch those embers.

NOTICES AND ALERTS

As of Mar 20, 2024 - Sawyer River Road is temporarily closed.

If you're planning to recreate in the Mt. Carrigan or Sawyer Pond area you should be aware Sawyer River Road in Bartlett, NH is closed to all vehicle access due to storm damage. A heavy rain event in December 2023 washed out a portion of the road making it impassable to vehicles. Foot travel will be allowed, although parking at the gate located on US Rt. 302 is limited. At this time there is no estimate when the road will be repaired.

Note to hikers: The Signal Ridge Trailhead for Mt. Carrigan is about a 2-mile trek from US302.






Mar 22 - 24, 2024 Spring into Spring Cabin Trip (with a weekend blizzard).




