NOMINATIONS

Officers.

Currently, no one has shared interest in announcing candidacy for any officer position. The presumption is that Julie Moran may take on the Treasurer role and the other current officers may serve another term.

Directors.

Currently, no one has shared interest in announcing candidacy for any existing Board Position. The presumption is that most current Directors may serve another term.

"At Large Board Director".

The Trips Director respectfully asks that members consider "At Large Board Director (s)".

The current bylaws effectively lock Subsig into seven specific director roles without amending the bylaws.

The bylaws do state that a majority of members present and voting at any annual meeting may change the duties or designations of, or eliminate the positions of any of the Directors. However, the changes would require revising the bylaws with a 2/3rd supermajority approval. One provision negates the other.

Please see the proposed amendment to the Subsig bylaws below. If the original intentions of the bylaws were to avoid creating a rigid governing body, the proposed amendment can carry out that.



PROPOSED AMMENDEMENT TO THE SUBSIG BYLAWS.

The proposed amendment provides an equal role on the Board of Directors for volunteers that take responsibility and willingly perform tasks aligned with the purpose and current needs of SubSig, for example:

- Communicate SubSig News and announcements on a regular basis.
- Acknowledge and honor volunteers past and present.
- Record and preserve Sub Sig history.
- Take on tasks as Sub Sig evolves or urgent matters become plain.

At-large Board members will further the purpose of Sub Sig and complete the tasks thoroughly on time. The at-large board members are just as important as nonprofit board positions as all board members.

The complete bylaws are available on www.sugsig.org. Edits to original text are highlighted in red below.

IV Officers and Directors

A. The Officers of the Corporation shall consist of the **President, Treasurer, Secretary** and **Auditor.** The Officers and the Trips Director, Membership Director, Cabin Director, Trails Director, Webmaster, and Database Manager, and three (3) At-large Board Members shall may constitute the Board of Directors. With the approval of a majority of members present and voting at any annual meeting the Directors may change the duties or designations of, or eliminate the positions of any of the Directors, except those of the four Officers, but in no case shall the number of members of the Board of Directors be less than seven. These Officers and members of the Board of Directors shall be elected at the annual meeting from and by the membership in good standing and shall hold office until their successors have been elected. An Officer may hold only one office at a time. The President and Treasurer shall not be eligible for more than four consecutive terms.

11. At-large board members shall perform duties as necessary for the current needs of the Corporation, prepare necessary organizational policies, communicate with members, train for other roles, have equal responsibility for the board's actions and decisions, attend all board meetings, and engage in board meetings actively.
